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By its very connotation word supplemetary does not denote something new. It is rather an adjunct or continuation of the parent work. The object of issuing such Supplementaries to the District Gazetteers is to update the statistical data contained in the parent volume and to make it consonant with the changes in varied spheres in the district. Supplements were issued in 1914, 1924 and 1934 to H. R. Nevill's Gazetteer volume of district Agra which was published in 1905.

The revised and rewritten Agra District Gazetteer, by Srimati E. B. Joshi, M.A., T. Dip. (London), I. A. S. (retd.), was published in 1965 by the Gazetteers Department in accordance with the all-India scheme of the Government of India. The present Supplement is the first and is intended to augment the information contained in the revised district Gazetteer with more recent statistics and data in the manner ordained by the synopsis of the Government of India and various instructions issued by the State Government from time to time. Every attempt has been made to bring this data as up-to-date as possible.

My thanks are due to Sri Rudra Shekhar Misra, Editor and Sarvsri Chandra Prabhakar Sharma and Sundar Lal, Team Leaders among the Compilation Officers, of whom Sri Sunder Lal has since retired, for their valuable assistance in this work. I am also thankful to other staff members of the office for their association in the preparation of this volume.

I will be failing in my duty if I do not express my thanks to Dr. P. N. Chopra, M. A., Ph. D., Editor (retd.) Central Gazetteers Unit, Ministry of Education. Government of India, New Delhi, as also the editorial staff of the Unit for their effective role in the planning and co-ordinating the work of preparation of the Supplementaries. The Unit scrutinised the Tables of this Supplementary with great care and made several helpful suggestions.

The information and statistical data contained in the Supplement is based on the Census publications for the years 1961 and 1971 and the various official records maintained at the office of the collector and district magistrate and the district offices of numerous departments of the Central and State Governments to whom my sincere thanks are due.

CHAPTER III

PEOPLE

POPULATION

According to the census of 1971, the area of the district was 4,816 sq. km. and the population was 23,08,638. The district occupied the 30th and 10th positions respectively with regard to size and population in the State.

MEDICAL FACILITIES

There were 61 allopathic medical institutions in the district in 1979. Of these the number of hospitals, primary health centres and dispensaries were 19, 18 and 24 respectively. As many as 2,868 beds were available in these institutions and each is manned by doctors, compounders, nurses, etc. The total number of indoor and outdoor patients treated in 1979 was 76,251 and 3,89,898 respectively. Two women hospitals were established at Etmadpur and Kheragarh and a State allopathic hospital at Kheragarh in 1978-79. However, the opening of primary health centres has changed the old picture, as extensive medical facilities have been created in the rural areas.

The following is a list of primary health contres of the district : 4 Genl (R)-12

Administrative Set-up

In July, 1973, the departments of medical and public health were reorganised, abolishing the posts of the civil surgeon and the district medical officer of health. Under the new set-up, a chief medical officer has been appointed, who heads the entire medical, public health and family planning set-up in the district. He is assisted by three deputy chief medical officers who supervise the district level hospitals, employees state insurance scheme, dispensaries, infections diseases hospitals and school heath dispensaries and primary health centres. Each deputy chief medical officer supervises his own area of jurisdiction.¹

Only 5 medical institutions are managed by private bodies, two of these are located in the rural areas (at Bateshwar and Lalpur), and the rest are situated at Agra. About 90 beds are available in the medical institutions in 1979-80.

In the year 1977-78, the community health scheme was introduced in the rural areas of the district. As many as 1,553 community health visitors have been trained and posted in the district. These visitors are trained to render first-aid and preliminary medical treatment, and are provided with medical-kits containing medicines, bandages, etc. The visitors also report the outbreak of epidemics, if any, to the respective primary health centres.

^{1.} The district has been divided into 3 administrative regions, each under one deputy chief medical officer since 1977.

SANITATION AND PUBLIC HEALTH

The three deputy chief medical officers exercise control and supervision over all health programmes and primary health centres, within their areas of jurisdiction. Besides, they are also responsible for the collection of intelligence about epidemics, checking of food and drug adulteration and also for providing necessary assistance during the floods and the outbreak of an epidemic or other natural calamities. For their assistance there are one assistant medical officer at the district headquarters and one to two medical officers in each primary health centre. A team of para-medical officials work under the medical officers.

For public health and sanitation work every local body has its own team of sanitary inspectors, vaccinators, etc. Besides, each Gaon Sabha is responsible for village sanitation. The services of sanitary inspectors are available to the Gaon Sabhas for technical help and guidance. The *Pradhans* (village headmen) report outbreak of epidemics to the primary health centres for initiating preventive and curative measures.

FAMILY PLANNING AND CHILD WELFARE

The chief medical officer exercises complete supervision over the maternity and child welfare, family planning and nutrition programmes. In this work he is assisted by 3 deputy chief medical officers and a team of medical officers, extension educators, midwives and *dais* (untrained midwives) and health visitors.

The family planning measures were introduced in the second-half of the fifties in the district. The family planning movement is being made popular and the concept of small family is being spread through films, placards, posters, radio and television and personal contact.

The family welfare programme in the district is implemented through the family welfare centres attached to primary healh centres. There were 18 family welfile centres in the district, each laving 3 sub-centres under it in 1979-80. The following statement gives the main achievements in the field of family planning in the district between the years 1973-74 and 1979-80.

Family Planning

MALARIA

The eradication programme of malaria was initiated in 1957, which progressed in three phases, i.e., attack phase (spraying of D. D. T. over the whole district for destroying mosquitoes etc.), the maintenance phase and the surveillance phase. The last two operations involved detection of malaria cases by collecting blood smears from all over the district and spraying of D. D. T. in areas where malaria was in vogue. Persons suffering from malaria were given radical treatment.

A team comprising a district malaria officer, two assistant malaria officers, 8 malaria inspectors, 36 health inspectors, 18 laboratory technicians and a senior laboratory technician, 152 basic health workers and others, is employed in the work of eradication of malaria in the district in 1979-80.

During the year 1974 the incidence of malaria rose to an alarming extent, primarily due to the import of infection from the bordering areas of Rajasthan. Intensive spraying of D. D. T. and radical treatment of patients was undertaken. Every village in the district has been covered by the malaria eradication team. The following statement gives some relevant data about the incidence and eradication of malaria in the district :

ERADICATION OF SMALLPOX

The national smallpox eradication scheme is in vogue in the district since 1962. Before the implementation of the scheme the assistant superintendent of vaccinations, posted at Agra and assisted by a team of sanitary inspectors and vaccinators, was responsible for the control of smallpox. He worked under the supervision of the district medical officer of health.

In the first two years of the scheme, efforts were made to vaccinate the entire population of the district under the overall charge of the district medical officer of health. The phase was known as the attack phase. At present the chief medical officer is incharge of the scheme and he is assisted by three deputy chief medical officers and a team of doctors, sanitary inspectors and vaccinators. The municipal corporation, Agra, has a medical officer, who is assisted by a team of sanitary inspectors and vaccinators. There is one vaccinator posted in each of the local bodies.

The incidence of smallpox has decreased considerably, while only in two years i.e. 1967 and 1973 it took a toll of 338 and 163 persons respectively, only 5 persons died of smallpox in 1975.

PROHIBITION

The government launched the prohibition scheme in the State in 1978. Under this scheme many districts of the State were declared 'dry' areas, but the scheme was not extended to this district. The government had, however, adopted certain measures to discourage people from indulging in addiction to drinks and intoxicants. A temperance society is functioning in the district. It consists of officials and non-officials and it works through publicity, persuasion and social contact. The temperance activities include the focussing of public attention on the evil effects of drinking and indulging in other intoxicants through film shows, exhibition of posters and playcards, cinema slides, documentary films, etc.

CHAPTER XVIII

PUBLIC LIFE AND VOLUNTARY SOCIAL SERVICE ORGANISATIONS

Vidhan Sabha (Legislative Assembly)

For the purpose of the general elections of 1967, the district was divided into ten single-member constituencies of Firozabad, Bah, Fatehabad, Tundla, Dayalbagh, Agra Cantonment, Agra East, Agra West, Kheragarh and Fatehpur Sikri. Bah and Dayalbagh seats were reserved for the members of the Scheduled Castes. One hundred and four candidates contested the elections, of whom ten each belonged to the Bhartiya Jan Sangh, the Congress, and the Republican party, nine to the Swatantra party, seven to the Samyukta Socialist party, one each to the Communist and the Praja Socialist parties and fifty-six were independents. Three seats each were won by the Congress and the Jan Sangh, two by the Samyukta Socialist, one seat by the Republican party and the remaining one went to an independent candidate.

The following statement shows the number of seats contested and won and the total valid votes secured by each political party and the independents in the assembly constituencies in the general elections of 1967 :

The total number of electors in the district in the general elections of 1967 was 9,82,353, the number of those who actually cast their votes was 5,46,515 and the total number of valid votes polled was 5,14,781.

The Vidhan Sabha constituted after the general elections was dissolved on February 25, 1968 due to a large number of defections among the members which forced the government to submit its resignation. The State was placed under the President's rule and a mid-term poll was held in 1969.

For the mid-term elections of 1969, the number of seats and the constituencies remained ten as before, two being reserved for the members of the Scheduled Castes. Eighty-nine candidates contested the elections, of whom 10 each were from the Bhartiya Kranti Dal and the Congress, 9 from the Bhartiya Jan Singh, 8 from the Republican party, 7 from the Proutist Block, 5 each from the Samyukta Socialist and the Swatantra parties, 4 from the Mazdoor Parishad, 2 from the Communist party and 29 were independent candidates. The Bhartiya Kranti Dal captured 4 seats and of the remaining 6 seats, 3 went to the Congress, 1 each to the Samyukta Socialist and the Swatantra parties and 1 to an independent candidate.

The total number of electors in the district in the mid-term elections of 1969 was 10,42,518, the number of those who actually cast their votes was 5,59,836 and the total number of valid votes polled was 5,44,623.

For the general elections of 1974, the number of seats allotted to the district and the number of the constituencies was raised to eleven—Firozabad, Bah, Fatehabad, Tundla, Etmadpur, Dayalbagh, Agra Cantonment, Agra East, Agra West, Kheragarh and Fatehpur Sikri. Etmadpur and Agra West seats were reserved for the members of the Scheduled Castes. The number of candidates who contested the elections was 144 of whom 11 were from the Congress, 10 from the Bhartiya Jan Sangh, 9 each from the Bhartiya Kranti Dal, the Republican (Khobragade) and the Socialist parties 8 from the Congress (O), 5 from the Swatantra party, 2 each from the Forward Block, Loktantrik Dal and the Muslim League and 77 were independent candidates. Of the 11 seats 6 were won by the Congress, 2 by the Bhartiya Kranti Dal and 1 each by the Congress (O), the Muslim League and the Swatantra party.

In the general elections of 1974, the total number of electors in the district was 12,29,144 the number of total votes polled was 7,36,063 and the number of total valid votes polled was 7,18,828.

After the assembly elections of 1974, the Congress led the State until a political upheaval rocked the party, leading to the resignation of the Congress ministry in November 1975, followed by the President's rule. The President's rule came to an end in January 1976, when the Congress ministry was again formed in the State. The dismal performance of the Congress in the 1977 general elections to Lok Sabha heralded emergence of the Janta party in power at the Centre paving the way for the dissolution of State assembly in May, 1977. The mid-term poll was held shortly after. This election was contested mainly between two parties—the Indian National Congress and the newly emerged Janta party.

For the mid-term election of 1977, the number of seats allotted to the district and the number of constituencies remained eleven as in 1974. Ninety one candidates contested the elections of whom 11 each, belonged to the Congress, and the Janta party. 4 to the Republican party (Khobragade), 2 each to the Forward Block and the Muslim League, 1 to the Revolutionary Socialist party and 60 were independents. The Janta party won eight seats and the remaining 3 were won by the Congress.

The following statement shows the number of seats contested and won and the total vlaid votes secured by each political party and the independents in the assembly constituencies in the general elections of 1977 :

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In the general elections of 1977, the number of electors in the district was 13,03,428, the number of total votes polled was 6,27,370 and the number of total valid votes polled was 6,19,040.

Lok Sabha (House of the People)

For the general elections of 1967 to the Lok Sabha, the district was constituted into two constituencies-Firozabad (reserved for the members of the Scheduled Castes) and Agra.. Elections were contested by 18 candidates, of whom 2 each belonged to the Bhartiya Jan Sangh, the Congress, the Republican and the Swatantra parties, 1 to the Samyukta Socialist party and 9 were the Independents. One seat was won by the Congress and the other by the Jan Sangh.

For the general elections of 1971 to the Lok Sabha, there was no change in the number of seats allotted to the district and the constituencies. Fourteen candidates contested the elections, of whom 2 each were from the Bhartiya Kranti Dal, the Congress (J) and the Forward Block, 1 each belonged to the Congress (N) and the Samyukta Socialist party and 6 were independent candidates. The Bhartiya Kranti Dal own both the two seats.

In the general elections to the Lok Sabha in 1977, the position of the district was the same as in 1967 and 1971, as regards the seats allotted to the district and the number of constituencies. The two seats were contested by 9 candidates, of whom 2 each belonged to the Bhartiya Lok Dal and the Congress and 5 were independent candidates. Both the seats were captured by the Bhartiya Lok Dal.

The number of electors in the general elections of 1971 and 1977 was 10,63,488 and 11,77,309 respectively, the number of total votes polled was 4,42,708 and 6,93,340 respectively and the total valid votes polled were 4,34,852 and 6,81,536 respectively.

VOLUNTARY SOCIAL SERVICE ORGANISATIONS

Meg Sanyar Shishu Sadan, Agra, was started in 1964, by the Harijan and social welfare department of the State with the object of looking after mentally retarded orphans.

Schools numbering 13 and libraries numbering 10 also received financial help from the Harijan and social welfare department in 1980.
